

Church Silent When POW/MIA Flag At County Vietnam Veterans Memorial Was Replaced With LGBTQ Flag

Do you think such a song as Lola had an impression on the minds of youth back in the day? It had me shaking my head. Even to this day when one hears that song it conjures up uncomfortable images for most of us. That was a beginning.



Along with music and television the 1970's Hollywood film industry played a major role towards corrupting the minds of young people with movies like, "A Clock Work Orange" (1971) with bizarre sexual scenes. The movie "Deliverance" (1972) shocked the world with our first big screen introduction to sodomy with poor Ned Beattie we'll not soon forget and how about the "Rocky Horror Picture Show" (1975) defined as, a

horror-rock-transvestite-camp-omnisexual-musical parody. It is truly astounding that in just 20 short years THEY took us from "Donna Reid" to "The Exorcist" and with our eyes wide open.
